CAE PARTNERS WITH NYCDOE'S SUMMER ARTS INSTITUTE

From **July 5 – August 4**, The Center for Arts Education will partner with **The New York City Department of Education's Office of Arts & Special Projects** for this year's **Summer Arts Institute**. Currently in its fifth year, this tuition-free, intensive, four-week arts program for New York City public school students entering grades 8-12 will be held at **Stuyvesant High School** in Manhattan. While offering arts career workshops for students and parents at the Institute, CAE staff from its Career Development Program will incorporate the use of its acclaimed Career Guides to help students identify their strengths and the bounty of opportunities and resources available for careers in the arts in New York City. CAE will also oversee the fiscal administration of the program this year and beginning in fall 2006, will assume complete administration of the program.

CAE SPONSORS INFO SESSION ON USING ANIMATION IN ARTS EDUCATION

As a component of its involvement in the career arts program at the **Summer Arts Institute**, CAE will co-sponsor a presentation by **The ACME Network** entitled *ACME Animation* on **July 27** at Stuyvesant High School. The presentation will explore the use of animation as a learning tool for arts education in the classroom. **Dave Master, Founding Director of ACME Animation**, and former middle school art teacher, will provide an overview of the ACME Animation program, which facilitates an online, interactive connection between New York City public school classrooms and animation professionals from companies such as Pixar, Disney, Warner Bros. and DreamWorks Animation SKG. The event is open to the Summer Arts Institute's faculty and students as well NYCDOE educators who are interested in learning about the program.

CAE AWARDS 2006-2007 PARTNERSHIP EXTENSION GRANTS

CAE has awarded 13 of its **2004-2006 Partnership Grant** recipients **Partnership Extension Grants** of \$20,000 each to continue their work into the 2006-2007 academic year. The schools will use this use this funding extension to identify, document and share their successful practices in integrating arts into their curricula. Examples include **MS 131: Dr. Sun Yat Sen School**, a Title 1 middle school in the Chinatown section of Manhattan, which will document the incorporation of digital photography and film studies into English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum; and **Marble Hill High School for International Studies** in the Bronx, which will focus on the promising practices that emerged while integrating theater, music, dance, storytelling and visual arts into science, history, and English curricula. The documentation work produced by all 13 grantees (listed on the following page) will be presented to CAE in June 2007.
